**Re: Potential U.S. Immigration-Related Consequences of
2008 United Healthcare Identity Theft**

UC Irvine remains very concerned about any possible adverse consequences to the individuals whose confidential personal information was unlawfully accessed during the 2008 United Healthcare data breach. One possible consequence could relate to the U.S. immigration laws.

Although we have no reason to believe that your personal information has been used improperly for immigration purposes, we are writing this letter to provide you with a special opportunity arranged through the Office of the Ombudsman of U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (“USCIS”) to:

- 1) Confirm the accuracy of any immigration data that may relate to you on file with USCIS, and/or
- 2) Obtain a letter from the USCIS Ombudsman to confirm that the data breach has been reported to the Department of Homeland Security (“DHS”) and that you are innocent of any wrongdoing (to be presented to any immigration official, as you wish, in the future).

Please indicate whether you wish to take advantage of these voluntary opportunities by returning to me at the address above no later than 2/27/09:

- a. A completed, signed and dated copy of the Letter of Authorization/Non-Authorization (a blank letter is attached); and
- b. A completed, signed and dated Form DHS 7001 (a blank form is attached).

The University’s outside law firm, Seyfarth Shaw LLP is coordinating communication with USCIS. Seyfarth Shaw has prepared the enclosed FAQ, which includes a sample answer to Question 12 (Description of Case Problem) on the Form DHS 7001.

If we do not receive the completed documents by 2/27/09, we will assume that you do not want to participate.
